Meet Our New Neighbor “Marty Robbins”

We are now on Historical Railroad Avenue, in Willcox, Arizona, Home Town of Rex Allen.

His son, Rex Allen Jr. heard that we were closing our Marty Robbins Glendale Exhibit that we had opened three years prior, having to close due to lack of funds.

We bought the property in 2001 in the Historical Catlin Court Area. We went to the City and got our rezoning permits to open a non-profit business. The house was not zoned for commercial use. The City was going to rezone

it that year, but something came up and they decided not to rezone 58th & Myrtle Avenue. After three months of filling out paper work, going to meetings, dotting our (i's) and crossing our (t's), Geri Rosato, Jo Wenger and I, felt we had everything ready for review for the zoning commission. They decided we should rezone the whole block on 58th & Myrtle Avenue, (9 homes), which put us even further away for our goal to open the Marty Robbins Glendale Exhibit in Marty's hometown.

It was a great undertaking but the three of us, with help from Shawn Ring, did the almost impossible. We had never undertaken such a task. We learned a lot.

We found out after we opened that Marty spent many nights in the 1918 bungalow, went to grade school across the street, and even attend church with his twin sister Mamie Robinson.

Our first year we greeted over five thousand people who truly loved Marty Robbins and was very happy someone had opened a

A Rex Allen fan, Allan's mother named him after the cowboy star. Now 87 years old, his mom still has the

It was a delight to think we could bring these wonderful fans such happiness over and over again. We had some fans stay all day watching his movies and concerts on a TV in our western room. The room Marty slept in when he visited the house many years ago. I was able to enjoy all this will while sharing it with his many fans. One gentleman, a New York Attorney, gave me the most delightful complement. He said I have traveled all over the world, I have seen many museums and sights, but visiting with you and seeing your collected tribute to Marty Robbins has been a pleasure and has made this vacation one I will always remember. Your heart & soul has gone into putting this exhibit together, and without help from the man you are remembering.

My collection isn't the caliber of the Rex Allen Museum. Mine is a collection of many years of finding anything and every thing I could get my hands on, that had to do with Marty Robbins. He was my idol and hero.

Hearing of our closing, Rex Allen Jr. saw the value and need of keeping Marty's Music & Memory alive. He sent his museum manager Delice Schultz and her husband Larry to Glendale. They invited us to move our Exhibit to Willcox. We had other offers. El Paso, Texas asked us to move to their town. Marty helped put El Paso, as well as Glendale Arizona, on the map. We also had offers from Peoria AZ and Apache Junction.

After a long hard soul searching effort, I decided I would move to a town that already had a world know Cowboy star. If they could find room for another Arizona Native singing star, that's the town for me & my Marty Robbins memorabilia.

Shawn Paul Ring, (my son), and I packed up everything and made the move over a few hard weeks that

ended up taking a few months. He had some help loading, in Glendale, from one of our Entertainers, our Realtor, and a hired hand.

Larry Schultz helped Shawn unload a truck full of furniture. But Shawn moved most of the Memorabilia. He did all the driving and heavy work to insure nothing was lost or broken.

Now we are in Willcox, with a building we signed a 15 year lease, as is, on the building at 156 N. Railroad Avenue, just two doors down from Rex Allen Museum.

We held our 17th Annual Tribute on March 22, 2008, with the help of Delcie & Larry. Shawn & I couldn't have done it with out those two. They said they would help us and they sure came through. They made our flyers, which Valley Telecom printed for us, they handed them out everywhere they went. They also handed them out in the museum. They told every one who came through the door we would be opening our Marty Robbins Museum soon. They made the tickets, designed our program and even drove to Tucson to pick them up.

The City of Willcox, the Rex Allen Museum and the National Day of The Cowboy helped us put on the Tribute as well as Bull Riding and Barrel racing event at Quail Park Arena. The Mayor opened our
